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### 1. Aims

This policy aims to:

- Set out our approach to requiring a uniform that is of reasonable cost and offers the best value for money for parents and carers
- Explain how we will avoid discrimination in line with our legal duties under the Equality Act 2010
- Clarify our expectations for school uniform

### 2. Our school’s legal duties under the Equality Act 2010

The Equality Act 2010 prohibits discrimination against an individual based on the protected characteristics, which include age, sex, disability, race, religion or belief, pregnancy and maternity, and gender reassignment.

To avoid discrimination, our school will:

- Avoid listing uniform items based on sex, to give all pupils the opportunity to wear the uniform they feel most comfortable in or that most reflects their self-identified gender
- Make sure that our uniform costs the same for all pupils
- Allow all pupils to have long hair (though we reserve the right to ask for this to be tied back)
- Allow all pupils to style their hair in a way that is appropriate for school and makes them feel most comfortable
- Allow pupils to request changes to swimwear for religious reasons or if they are experiencing discomfort related to their sex, gender or gender reassignment
- Allow pupils to wear headscarves and/or other religious garments
- Allow pupils with sensory or physical needs to make reasonable adaptations to their uniform depending on their specific needs
- Allow for reasonable adaptations to our policy on the grounds of equality by asking pupils or their parents/carers to contact the school office, who can answer questions about the policy and respond to any requests. These will be considered on a case-by-case basis

### 3. Limiting the cost of school uniform

Our school has a duty to make sure that the uniform we require is affordable, in line with statutory guidance from the Department for Education (DfE) on the cost of school uniform.

We understand that items with distinctive characteristics (such as branded items, or items that need to have a school logo or a unique fabric/colour/design) cannot be purchased from a wide range of retailers and that requiring many such items limits parents/carers' ability to 'shop around' for a low price.

We will make sure our uniform:

- Is available at a reasonable cost
- Provides the best value for money for

parents/carers We will do this by:

- Carefully considering whether any items with distinctive characteristics are necessary
- Limiting any items with distinctive characteristics where possible
- Limiting items with distinctive characteristics to low-cost and/or long-lasting items, such as ties
- Considering cheaper alternatives to school-branded items, such as logos that can be ironed on, as long as this doesn't compromise quality and durability
- Avoiding specific requirements for items pupils could wear on non-school days, such as coats, bags and shoes
- Keeping the number of optional branded items to a minimum, so that the school's uniform can act as a social leveller
- Avoiding different uniform requirements for different year/class/house groups
- Avoiding different uniform requirements for extra-curricular activities
- Considering alternative methods for signalling differences in groups for interschool competitions, such as creating posters or labels
- Making sure that arrangements are in place for parents/carers to acquire second-hand uniform items
- Avoiding frequent changes to uniform specifications and minimising the financial impact on parents/carers of any changes
- Consulting with parents/carers and pupils on any proposed significant changes to the uniform policy and carefully considering any complaints about the policy

### 4. Expectations for school uniform

#### 4.1 Our school's uniform

It is expected that all children wear school uniform. This consists of black trousers, skirt or pinafore dress, white polo shirt and royal blue sweatshirts/ cardigans. Jeans are not allowed. In the summer children may also wear knee length school shorts and blue and white gingham dresses.

Footwear, including laces should be black. If boots are worn during times of bad weather children should change into school shoes on arrival at school. **High heels are not allowed under any circumstances for health and safety reasons.**

Whilst the wearing of earrings is discouraged, for safety reasons **only stud types** are acceptable. Children should wear **one** stud in each ear only. No other studs/rings should be worn on any other part of the body. We also ask that you avoid extreme hairstyles for your child during term time. This includes completely shaven hair.

**We encourage children to take a pride in themselves and in the school and we find that often, children who follow fashion icons, are embarrassed when they come into school and stand out as different. The purpose of school uniform is to encourage all children to have the opportunity to look the same and identify, with pride, with our school and each other.**

For PE children need black shorts, light blue polo shirt and trainers. These are available to order from Stratford's of Kings Lynn. Trainers may be worn for outside activities but are not allowed on indoor apparatus. Children should not wear clothing for P.E. that they have been wearing as part of their school uniform. Polo shirts and shorts are available to purchase from supermarkets. Winter PE Kit consists of plain black or navy tracksuit with light blue polo shirt.

For swimming girls should wear a one-piece swimming costume. Boys should wear swimming trunks or swimming shorts (not Bermuda shorts). Swimming hats should always be worn and can be purchased from Stratford's of Kings Lynn or local sports stores.

**NB: All clothing and games equipment should be clearly named and kept in a suitable named bag. Lost property is retained for one term only and is then disposed of.**

#### **4.2 Where to purchase it**

School uniform can be ordered from Stratford's of Kings Lynn at 17-19 Hamburg Way, North Lynn Industrial Estate, King's Lynn PE30 2ND. Order online at <https://www.stratfords.com/> You are also able to purchase the correct colour sweatshirt / cardigans from local supermarkets. We would encourage you to have at least one embroidered sweatshirt or cardigan for school photos and school trips.

### **5. Expectations for our school community**

#### **5.1 Pupils**

Pupils are expected to wear the correct uniform at all times (other than specified non-school uniform days) while:

- On the school premises
- Travelling to and from school
- At out-of-school events or on trips that are organised by the school, or where they are representing the school (if required)

Pupils are also expected to contact the school office if they wish to request an amendment to the uniform policy in relation to their protected characteristics.

#### **5.2 Parents and carers**

Parents and carers are expected to make sure their child has the correct uniform and PE kit, and that every item is:

- Clean
- In good condition
- Clearly labelled with the child's name

Parents/carers are also expected to contact the school office if they want to request an amendment to the uniform policy in relation to:

- Their child's protected characteristics
- The cost of the uniform

Parents/carers are expected to lodge any complaints or objections relating to the school uniform in a timely and reasonable manner.

Disputes about the cost of the school uniform will be:

- Resolved locally
- Dealt with in accordance with our school's complaints policy

The school will work closely with parents/carers to arrive at a mutually acceptable outcome.

### **5.3 Staff**

Staff will closely monitor pupils to make sure they are in correct uniform. They will give any pupils and families breaching the uniform policy the opportunity to comply but will follow up with the headteacher if the situation doesn't improve.

In cases where it is suspected that financial hardship has resulted in a pupil not complying with this uniform policy, staff will take a mindful and considerate approach to resolving the situation.

### **5.4 Governors**

The Trust Board will review this policy and make sure that it:

- Is appropriate for our school's context
- Is implemented fairly across the school
- Takes into account the views of parents/carers and pupils
- Offers a uniform that is appropriate, practical and safe for all pupils

The board will also make sure that the school's uniform supplier arrangements give the highest priority to cost and value for money, for example by avoiding single supplier contracts and by re-tendering contracts at least every 5 years.

### **6. Monitoring arrangements**

This policy will be reviewed annually by Headteachers. At every review, it will be approved Trust Standards Committee on behalf of the Trust Board.
